



DRONE CHALLENGE

On Thursday October the 28th the company 'DISEASD' ventured to the PIRSA site at the Loxton Research Centre. We have finally received the results. Unfortunately we didn't win the competition but we won the right to feel extremely proud of our efforts. Below is the feedback from the judges.

- You performed well in the Flight section of the Challenge, with high marks for your safety systems. You did a good job at locating diseased trees, and received a high initial score.
- Unfortunately, you lost some points for your presentation of the tree location results in the Final Report. The map was too generalised, and the table was inverted, both of which did not make it easy for the grower (us) to go out to the citrus patch and find the diseased trees. One clear map in the right orientation would have been more useful than the two versions you gave us.
- Your Oral Presentation was good, but you didn't give a good account of your understanding of the disease and the treatment options available.
- The Final Report was good, apart from the tree location information mentioned above.
- Overall you were well organised, you each knew your role, and you performed very well, only just missing out on the win. This was especially impressive given that you didn't make it to the Dry Run Day, so you got all of the information you needed from the Manual. Well done!

YEAR 9 PASTA MAKING

Year 9 students were fortunate enough to make pasta with the tomatoes that were picked and frozen in Semester 1. The students first started off by peeling the tomatoes and then destemming them. This was then followed by students making their own dough mixture to make some fresh pasta ready to be kneaded and put through the pasta machine. Cooking the sauce was the last step and then it was time to devour the 'fruits of their labour'.




This year, the label was a combination of two students' artwork. Chelsea Helbig and Emily Brock both contributed to the label design.
